Over the last thirty years, China has experienced rapid growth in economy and international influence. “China’s rise,” as some scholars call it, has led to a discussion of profound changes in the global structure, particularly the global networks of connectivity such as sources of labor, the production line, the supply chain, the disposal chain, financial exchanges, and consumption patterns. In this talk, Professor Hon will examine long-standing presuppositions that have shaped the Chinese perceptions of the world since the beginning of the twentieth century. Drawing ideas and insights from a wide range of disciplines, including Cultural Studies, History, Geography, Political Science, and Sociology, this talk will provide students and scholars a multi-dimensional perspective on the formation of Chinese worldviews.
