▶ From the President

This is certainly an important time of transition for Fredonia, and I'm very proud of the ways our campus community is coming together in a challenging time. With Dr. David Tiffany's retirement in December 2015, after more than ten years of outstanding service, **Ms. Betty Gossett** was promoted to Interim Vice President for University Advancement and Interim Director of the Fredonia College Foundation, and she is already doing a great job of continuing Dave's legacy and establishing her own direction as a leader. The appointment is for two years to allow a smooth transition with the comprehensive campaign; we expect to do a full, national search in the Fall of 2017.

Dr. David Herman announced in January that he will be retiring in July 2016 from his role as Vice President for Student Affairs, a position he has held since 2001. He has contributed substantially to the growth of the division, overseeing many positive changes in campus life, residence life, first-year programs, recruitment and enrollment, financial aid, health and counseling services, student government and other organizations, and other areas. Clearly, he leaves large shoes to fill, and the Senate Chair and I have charged a search committee with conducting a national search for a new Vice President to begin, ideally, in early summer 2016. Members of the College Council will all be invited to the retirement reception planned for early summer.

Sadly, the sudden death of **Ms. Liz Praetorius**, Vice President for Finance and Administration, in February has left Fredonia not only mourning a smart, talented colleague and friend, but also needing to have immediate leadership in key areas of our institution. Fortunately for Fredonia, **Mr. Kevin Seitz** has agreed to serve as Interim Vice President while we conduct a national search. A recent retiree who lives in Western New York, he brings valuable SUNY and other experience to step into this role immediately and assist us in a smooth transition. Kevin served for more than 30 years in university services and financial reporting at the University at Buffalo before becoming Vice Chancellor for Administration and Finance at East Carolina University. After five years there, he became the Associate Vice Chancellor for Finance at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he also served as Interim Vice Chancellor for Finance and Administration, managing a \$2.4 billion budget for the university and 2,000 employees in his division. We welcome him at this College Council meeting.

This is the final College Council meeting for **Mr. Michael Barone**, Director of Marketing and Communication since 2008. He will start next week at Tipping Point, an advertising firm in Buffalo, leaving his mark on many Fredonia initiatives he led: revision of the mission statement and logo, redesigns of the Statement, Campus Report, and website, and development of many print, television, and radio communications for marketing. A search for the critical position will begin soon.

After a successful search, a new Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, **Dr. J. Andy Karafa**, will begin in summer 2016. This appointment by Dr. Terry Brown, Provost, brings experience in curricular revision, faculty governance and collaboration, and new program development to this leadership role in the College. His academic specialty is organizational psychology, and his most recent position was Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences at Ferris State University in Michigan.

Despite these changes, the campus has continued to move forward on these big initiatives:

- Strategic Enrollment Planning process
- Work toward the approved SUNY Excels goals
- Emergency preparedness training, scheduled for April
- Strategic Plan for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

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In addition, SUNY has determined that Fredonia is one of the campuses scheduled for a **Presidential Review** this spring. Because I had already asked the University Senate to engage in a review so that I could have helpful feedback, finishing my fourth year as President, I am glad to have an expanded review at the SUNY System level. If any emeriti would like to see the materials prepared for SUNY and to offer your perspectives, please share your ideas with University Senate Chair Rob Deemer and the campus committee.

One of the things I am most proud of at Fredonia these days is the ways groups continue to talk together and work together for understanding. The most moving such example was held in February, when the **Black Student Union** organized a panel discussion on life at Fredonia for students of color. This dialogue, shown in the photo below, offered frank and sometimes difficult accounts of situations faced by students of color at Fredonia.



The audience included many members of BSU, other students, faculty, directors from across campus, and senior administrators, including Provost Brown, Vice President Herman, and me. We heard personal accounts and suggestions, along with many descriptions of the positive things students find here in programs, in residence halls, and in the community of Fredonia people. As students across the country examine the impact of race on policies and practices at their campuses, I'm proud that Fredonia students share those concerns in ways that invite listening and call for response.

I couldn't be happier to be right where I am, right at this moment of Fredonia's history.
